

Preparatory Requirements for Conversion Education and Behavior

In the assessment by the Sandra Caplan Bet Din's panel, a conversion candidate must meet the following intellectual and behavioral standards:

- **a. Knowledge**. The candidate should know:
 - i. The special days of the Jewish year, their meaning and observance.
 - ii. Jewish life cycle observances.
 - iii. Basic Jewish beliefs, values and sacred texts.
 - iv. The uniqueness of Judaism among world religions.
 - v. The customs of synagogue worship and knowledge of some central prayers, including the *Sh'ma*.
 - vi. Jewish community life, including the communal resources available to support and enhance an individual's Jewish life.
 - vii. Basic features of Jewish history.
 - viii. Awareness of the meaning of modern Israel to Jewish life.
 - ix. Awareness of the pluralistic nature of Judaism.
 - x. Awareness of Jewish dietary laws, customs and values.
- **b. Behavior.** The candidate should, by the time of conversion:
 - i. Participate in a synagogue or another appropriate, ongoing religious community (e.g., Hillel).
 - ii. Incorporate significant elements of Jewish ritual and moral practice in his or her life, with the intention of learning and doing more.
 - iii. Sever allegiance to any other religion and its practices.
